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## **BILIARY TUBE**

#### WHY DO I NEED THE TUBE?

- Your doctor has referred you to the Interventional Radiology for placement of this tube.
- The tube was placed to help drain bile from your liver.

#### **HOW LONG WILL I HAVE THE TUBE?**

- The tube will stay in until the obstruction is completely drained. That can be from two (2)
  weeks to several weeks.
- Your referring doctor will arrange follow-up care. Follow up imaging may be required before your tube is removed.

### **SEDATION**

The sedation you received during your procedure is still in your system. Therefore, we would like you to take it easy the rest of the day and evening. Do not drive and avoid drinking alcohol.

#### CARE AFTER THE PROCEDURE

- The tube will be attached to a bag outside your body to collect the fluid or may be capped.
- The tube may be sutured in place. Do not let the bag hang or it may pull the tube out.
- Avoid strenuous activity while the tube is in place.
- Do NOT take a bath or go swimming while the tube is in place.
- You will have a bandage covering the insertion site of the tube. Change this bandage as
  needed to keep the area clean and dry. You can also clean around the tube with antibacterial
  soap (example, Dial or Safeguard) and water. Apply a clean gauze pad over the tube insertion
  site and tape securely. To shower, cover tube and dressing with plastic wrap two (2) days after
  the tube placement.
- The tube (s) may require flushing.
  - If this is required, a nurse, prior to discharge, will show you.
- If you experience discomfort from the tube, you may take Tylenol or Advil, unless you are restricted from these medications.
- Check with your doctor.

#### WHEN TO CALL YOUR DOCTOR

• Inability to flush the tube, the bile leaks around the tube, or if the tube falls out.
